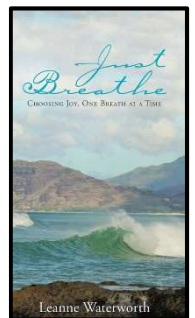

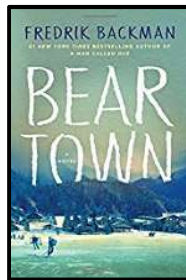

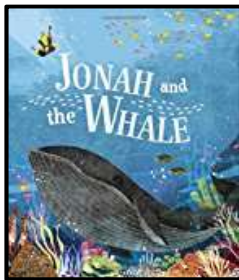

BEARTOWN; a Novel by Fredrik Backman, Atria Books, 2017.



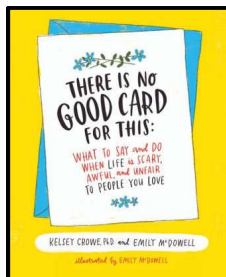
Hockey is everything in Beartown where jobs are disappearing and the town is slowly dying. Seventeen-year-old star Kevin has a chance to go professional. Then, at a party at his house, things get out of hand with Maya. What takes place changes Beartown forever. Covering up a heinous crime is not up for debate if the town is going to make economic and social advances. While the story is dark at times, love, sacrifice, and the bonds of friendship and family shine through, ultimately offering hope and even redemption. Backman is the author of *A Man Called Ove*.

JONAH AND THE WHALE by Rachel Elliot, Paragon, 2017.



Discover how and why Jonah is rescued from a terrible storm at sea by a giant whale. A simple retelling of the Old Testament story of forgiveness, written for children ages 3-6. Beautifully illustrated.

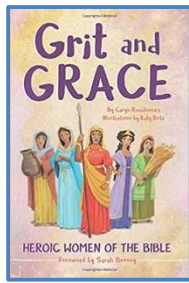

This illustrated step-by-step guide teaches readers how to offer comfort and support when someone they know is experiencing grief, loss, illness, or any other difficult situation. It includes workbook exercises, sample dialogs, and real-life examples. McDowell is the creator of the viral hit “Empathy Cards;” Dr. Crowe is a compassion expert.

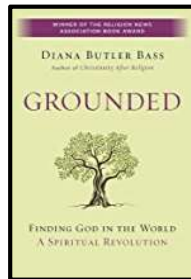
GRIT AND GRACE; Heroic Women of the Bible

by Caryn Rivadeneira, Sparkhouse Family, 2017.



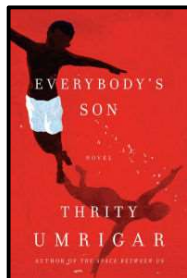
This book was written to connect preteen girls with strong, smart, feisty and determined women in the Bible and show them that they are created in the image of God to do mighty things in this world. Each chapter includes an imaginative first person retelling of the woman's story, quick facts, the Biblical citation, questions to think about, and a prayer prompt. The 17 women include not only Eve, Naomi and Mary but also Hagar, Rahab and the Samaritan woman.

GROUNDLED; Finding God in the World – A Spiritual Revolution by Diana Butler Bass, HarperOne, 2017.



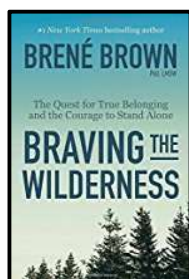
The headlines are clear: religion is on the decline in America as many people leave behind traditional religious practices. Bass argues that what appears to be a decline is a signal of a major transformation in how people understand and experience God. The distant God of conventional religion has given way to a more intimate sense of the sacred that is with us in the world. This shift is at the heart of a spiritual revolution that is challenging not only religious institutions but political and social ones.

EVERYBODY'S SON; a Novel by Thrity Umrigar, HarperCollins, 2017.



Umrigar explores issues of race, class, privilege, and power in her latest novel. When 10-year-old biracial Anton's mother is imprisoned, he becomes the foster child of a white Harvard educated judge who uses his connections to keep Anton from his mother permanently. Many years later, when Anton discovers the truth about his life, his birth mother, and his adopted parents, he must come to terms with the moral complexities of the crimes committed by the people he loves most.

BRAVING THE WILDERNESS; The Quest for True Belonging and the Courage to Stand Alone by Brené Brown, Random House, 2017.



Best-selling social scientist Brené Brown has sparked a global conversation about the experiences that bring meaning to our lives -- courage, vulnerability, love, belonging, shame, and empathy. In *Braving the Wilderness*, she redefines what it means to truly belong in an age of increased polarization. With her trademark mix of research, storytelling, and honesty, Brown's goal is to change the cultural conversation while mapping a clear path to true belonging. "True belonging doesn't require us to *change* who we are. It requires us to *be* who we are."

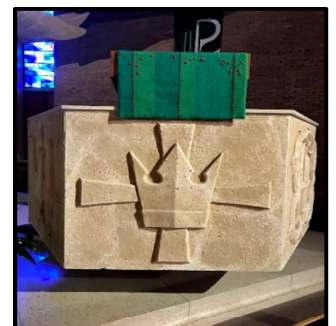
Outgoing Co-Presidents Jeanne Weingart and Ann Steen and Secretary Janet Brownell were thanked for their service.

The Card Catalog: Books, Cards, and Literary Treasures

The Library of Congress recently issued a colorful celebration of the treasures in its collection and the catalog system that has kept it organized. The text addresses the history of the library, the science of cataloging, the cards as aesthetic objects, and the advent of computerized data bases. It is interspersed with over 200 full-color images of original catalog cards and first edition book covers and title pages – ranging from Shakespeare’s First Folio to *The Cat in the Hat* to *The Catcher in the Rye* to *The Joy of Cooking*. In his review of the book for *The Washington Post*, Michael Lindgren writes that “the conceptual structure” of the card catalog “was the underpinning of the Internet. The idea of something being ‘tagged’ by category owes its existence as an organizing principle to the subject headings delineated by the Library of Congress. A national card catalog system was the original ‘search engine’ – one that needed no electricity, no service providers or broadband or smartphones, and that was truly democratic.”

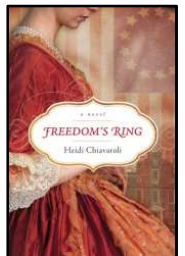


Emerging Christian Authors

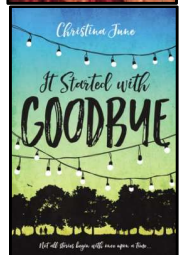

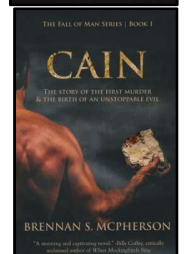
