

TCACLA Fall Meeting Westwood Lutheran Church October 12, 2024 8:30-12:30

Have you ever debated whether or not to add a book to your church's collection? How did you come to a decision? How have you responded to questions from church members or others about your collection? Does your church have a statement or process in place to respond to a request that a book be banned?

Please join J.R. Genett, deputy director at Hennepin County Library, to discuss book bans in libraries. J.R. will explain what is a book challenge versus a ban, how public libraries handle these situations, and trends happening around the United States on this topic. She will also discuss the importance of intellectual freedom and the First Amendment.

J.R. Genett is the deputy director of support services at Hennepin County Library, a 41-library system serving Minneapolis and the surrounding county. She is actively involved with the American Library Association, serving on a number of committees and round tables focused on intellectual freedom.



Per the American Library Association, a record 4,240 unique book titles were targeted for censorship in 2023, a 65% increase over the 2,571 unique titles targeted in 2022 and a staggering 128% increase over 2021 numbers. 47% of the books targeted for censorship were titles representing the voices and lived experiences of LGBTQIA+ and BIPOC individuals. Multi-title challenges from groups and individuals comprised about 89% of all book challenges in public libraries in 2023. In 2019, multi-title challenges made up only 5% of book challenges.



JESUS FOR EVERYONE; Not Just Christians by


Amy-Jill Levine, HarperOne, 2024.

A FAMILY PRAYER by Shay Youngblood,








People of God have often believed that individuals are poor because of personal choice. This absolves the social institutions of society, including the church, from responsibility to address structural forces, including within the church itself. Charity and benevolence become the antidote for such a diagnosis of poverty, rather than the deeply rooted change that God intended for the Year of Jubilee and that the early church reflected. This book supports the biblical mandate of neighborliness as both a personal and a corporate response to systemic poverty, a mandate that is the second of the two great commandments.





Mettes, a behavioral scientist, illustrates the profound physical, emotional, and social toll of loneliness in the United States, especially among the youngest adults. She highlights the role that belonging, friendship, closeness, and expectations play in preventing it. She also offers meaningful ways the church can minister to lonely people, going far beyond simplistic solutions--like helping them meet new people--to addressing their inner lives and the God who understands them.

A journalist analyzes the narratives surrounding 6 hot-button issues—immigration, COVID, abortion, critical race theory, gun violence, and climate change. For each topic, she exposes how “us versus them” thinking leads us to turn a blind eye to injustice. Amid culture wars that goad us to take up arms, McNeil reminds readers that Christ calls us to take up our cross. Humorous and insightful, the book offers a nuanced and authentically Christian mode of political engagement.


In 2020, crippled by abdominal pain, Junger was rushed to the hospital. As he began slipping away, he was visited by his dead father, inviting Junger to join him, telling him there is nothing to be afraid of. When he came to, he was told he had suffered a ruptured aneurysm that he should not have survived. This experience spurred Junger, a confirmed atheist, to undertake a scientific, philosophical, and deeply personal examination of mortality and what happens after we die. Part medical drama, part searing autobiography, and part rational inquiry into the ultimate unknowable mystery.

In his newest book, activist McLaren engages with the catastrophic failure of both our religious and political leaders to address the dominant realities of our time: ecological overshoot, economic injustice, and the increasing likelihood of civilizational collapse. Blending insights from philosophers, poets, scientists, and theologians, he explores the complexity of hope, the necessity of grief, and the need for new ways of thinking, becoming, and belonging in turbulent times.

How many of these books are in your church library? Did you know that they are banned in some libraries? Following J.R. Genett's presentation on October 12, Jeanne Schleh will moderate what is sure to be a lively discussion about banned books and church libraries, beginning with some of our members sharing their experiences.

The most banned book of all time is **1984** but the reasons for the banning have varied over time.

The United Church of Christ has developed a "Banned Books Blessing" worship resource that is available for download on its website.

Charlotte's Web is banned in a few schools because some religious people believe that only human beings should be portrayed with the ability to communicate through speech.


Book banning has been around for a long time. In 213 BCE, a Chinese emperor banned every book that wasn't concerned with agriculture, medicine, telling the future, or the emperor himself.

A California school district once banned **The Lorax** because it "criminalized the foresting industry" and would encourage children to oppose logging.


