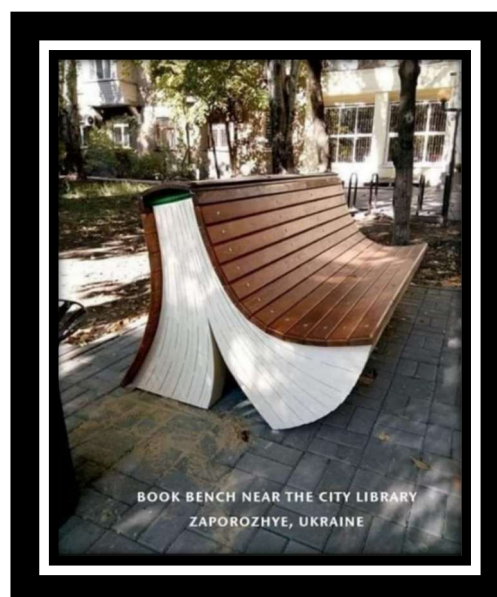

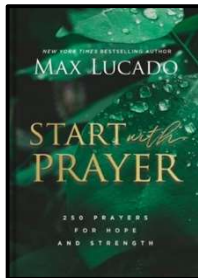

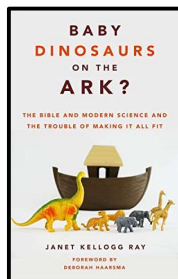

START WITH PRAYER: 250 Prayers for Hope and Strength by Max Lucado, Thomas Nelson, 2022.



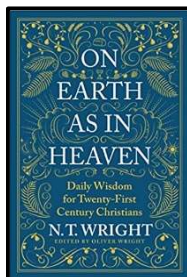
When struggles and anxieties come up in our lives, we invite God into our world, watching our fears surface and then depart. But how do we help prayer become a tried-and-true practice in our daily lives? Pairing timeless scripture with 250 thoughtful prayers, Lucado has created a special collection that will help readers develop the strength and hope they need to turn to prayer first in any situation they're facing. A resource for both people learning to pray for the first time and those hoping to reinvigorate their prayer life.

BABY DINOSAURS ON THE ARK? The Bible and Modern Science and the Trouble of Making It All Fit by Janet Ray, Eerdmans, 2021.



Ray, a science educator who grew up a creationist, works through the findings of a range of fields including geology, paleontology, and biology to show how a literal interpretation of the book of Genesis simply doesn't mesh with what we know to be reality. But, as someone who remains a committed Christian, she also shows how an acceptance of the theory of evolution is not necessarily an acceptance of atheism, and how God can still be responsible for having created the world, even if it wasn't in a single, momentary, miraculous event.

ON EARTH AS IN HEAVEN; Daily Wisdom for 21st Century Christians by N. T. Wright, HarperOne, 2022.



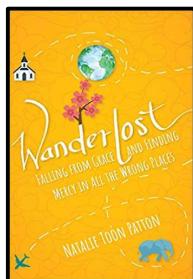
Christians can now rely on Wright's wisdom to guide them through each day with this book of meditations, featuring short pastoral excerpts carefully curated from the scholar's widely celebrated books. With reflections on themes such as faith, mission, character, and God's work in the world, these daily meditations are intended to invigorate and uplift Christians in their search to live their faith authentically and biblically in today's world.

WHEN THE MEADOW BLOOMS by Ann H. Gabhart, Revell, 2022.



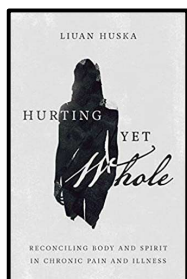
In her latest novel, Gabhart explores the tender places within the human heart via a character-driven story of trusting God to turn our burdens into something beautiful. Rose and her daughters are hoping to recover from the events of the recent past - the loss of her husband during the 1918 influenza epidemic, her struggle with tuberculosis, and her girls' experience in an orphanage during her illness - at her brother-in-law's farm. But Dick is struggling with his own pain after being badly scarred by a fire and abandoned by the woman he loves.

WANDERLOST; Falling from Grace and Finding Mercy in All the Wrong Places by Natalie Toon Patton, Paraclete Press, 2021.



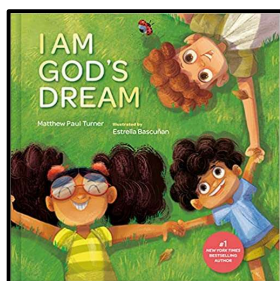
Once the golden girl of her small Arkansas town, Toon found herself shamed and rejected after being kicked out of church for getting a divorce. It's a hard fall off a sanctimonious high horse and religious fundamentalism has left her feeling broken and stuck. But she can't shake the "wanderlust woes" that have plagued her since childhood, so she runs away to the Middle East. A coming-of-age travel memoir that probes thorny spiritual questions as the author walks squarely into the unknown to confront the secret matters of the soul that we wrestle with at night.

HURTING YET WHOLE; Reconciling Body and Spirit in Chronic Pain and Illness by Luan Huska, IVP, 2020.



What if the things we most fear about our bodies - our vulnerability to illness and pain - are exactly the places where God meets us most fully? As Huska went through years of chronic pain, she wondered why God seemed absent and questioned some of the common assumptions about healing. Her story takes readers on a journey of exploring how healing is not an escape from the limits of the body, but becoming whole as souls in bodies and bodies with souls.

I AM GOD'S DREAM by Matthew Paul Turner, Convergent Books, 2022.

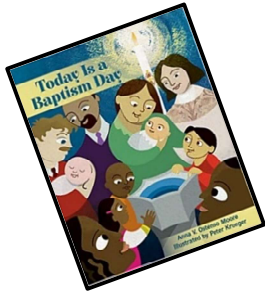


A beautiful celebration of the unique traits in every child and how God delights in each one, from the author of *When God Made You*. In this deeply affirming picture book, children of all faith traditions will discover the truth that God loves us deeply and delights in who we are; the unique strengths and traits that make up our lives; and the beautiful richness in diversity. Ages 3-7.

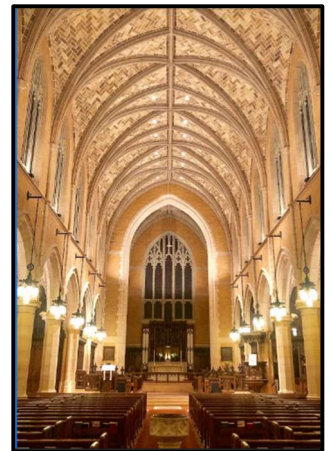
BOOK SWAP: Your library may have a duplicate copy of a book or a gently used book that you no longer need. If so, consider bringing it to the meeting to share with others. Despite the word "swap," there is no requirement that you bring a book to take a book. If you bring a book that hasn't been taken by the end of the meeting, please take it home with you.

Saint Mark's life began in 1858 as a north Minneapolis mission of Gethsemane Church. It was incorporated as a parish in 1863. Over time, the congregation grew and moved to other locations. When a parishioner offered to sell a portion of her Loring Park estate to the church at a very generous price, the dream of Bishop Samuel Cook Edsall to build a new cathedral for the Diocese of Minnesota was realized. Within 5 years of its opening in 1910, the church had over 1,000 members. Its designation as cathedral came in 1941.



The cathedral is known for its unique bell tower. It chimes throughout the daytime and is lighted with seasonal colors throughout the year.

A public labyrinth is available in the historic Whipple Chapel during regular cathedral hours. Provided as an opportunity to "make a pilgrimage in place," the labyrinth represents our circuitous journey with God and invites us to involve our whole body in prayer.

How do I get there?

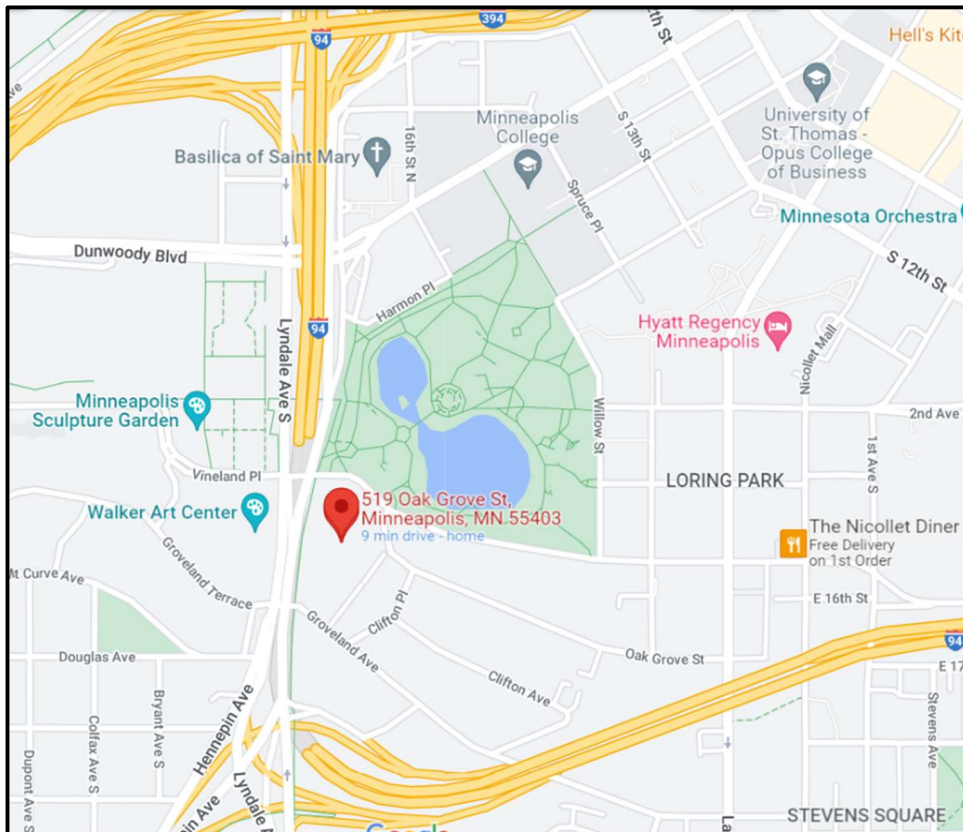
From the north via 35W – Merge onto I-94 west near downtown Minneapolis. Take I-94 west to the Lyndale-Hennepin exit 231B. Stay in the right lane. Just before Loring Park, you will see the cathedral on your right. Turn right on Oak Grove St. The entrance to the parking lot will be on your right.

From the south via 35W – Merge onto I-94 west at exit 16A on the left lane near downtown Minneapolis. Take I-94 west to the Lyndale-Hennepin exit 231B. Stay in the right lane. Just before Loring Park, you will see the cathedral on your right. Turn right on Oak Grove St. The entrance to the parking lot will be on your right.

From the east via I-94 – Take the Hennepin-Lyndale exit 231B. Stay in the right lane. Just before Loring Park, you will see the cathedral on your right. Turn right on Oak Grove St. The entrance to the parking lot will be on your right.

From the west via I-394 – Take the Dunwoody Blvd exit 8A. Turn right on Lyndale Ave and move into the far left lane. You will see the cathedral ahead of you. Just past Loring Park, turn left on Oak Grove St. The entrance to the parking lot will be on your right.

From the northwest via I-94 – At exit 231A&B near downtown Minneapolis, merge onto Lyndale Ave and move into the far left lane. You will see the cathedral ahead of you. Just past Loring Park, turn left on Oak Grove St. The entrance to the parking lot will be on your right.



Where do I go from the parking lot?

Walk towards the front of the cathedral. It's on your right when you are facing the building. We will be gathering at the bottom of the stairs up to the nave.

If you arrive at 9:30 or later and we've moved inside, walk towards the front of the cathedral. Before you reach

the nave, you will see a small courtyard and signs for the Cathedral Bookshop and the Church Office. The main entrance is at the far end of the courtyard. Ring the doorbell to be let in. Once inside, proceed through the vestibule to the reception desk. Turn left and walk into the next room. The conference room where we're meeting will be through the double doors on your right.
