some of the same information on our website, www.tcaccla.com, and maintains the archives of *Off the Shelf* that are stored there.

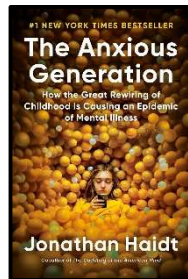

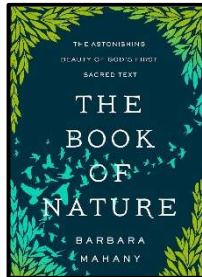

THE ANXIOUS GENERATION: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness by Jonathan Haidt, Penguin Press, 2024.



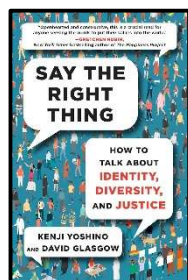
After more than a decade of stability or improvement, the mental health of adolescents plunged in the early 2010s. Rates of depression, anxiety, self-harm, and suicide rose sharply, more than doubling on many measures. Why? THE BOOK OF NATURE; The Astonishing Beauty of God’s First Sacred Text by Barbara Mahany, Broadleaf Books, 2023.



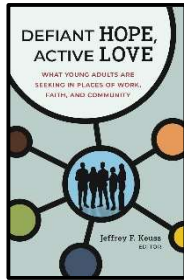

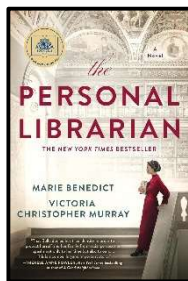
The fear of saying the wrong thing sometimes prevents us from speaking up at all, thus depriving people from marginalized groups of support and stalling progress toward a more just and inclusive society. Through stories drawn from contexts as varied as social media posts, dinner party conversations, and workplace disputes, the authors offer 7 user-friendly principles that teach skills such as how to avoid common conversational pitfalls, engage in respectful disagreement, offer authentic apologies, and better support people in our lives who experience bias.

DEFIANT HOPE, ACTIVE LOVE: What Young Adults Are Seeking in Places of Work, Faith, and Community by Jeffrey Keuss, Eerdmans, 2024.



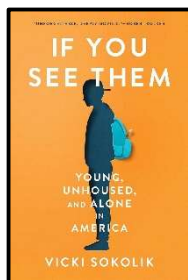
Keuss, a professor of Christian ministry, theology, and culture, and a multigenerational team of scholars investigated how faith communities can make themselves more hospitable to the next generation of Christians. Backed by 5 years of qualitative and quantitative research, the Pivot NW research team offers practical recommendations for involving young adults in the community, including loosening demands for church membership, involving young adults in leadership earlier, addressing the economic difficulties of millennials, and understanding religious trauma.

THE PERSONAL LIBRARIAN by Marie Benedict and Victoria C. Murray, Berkley, 2021.



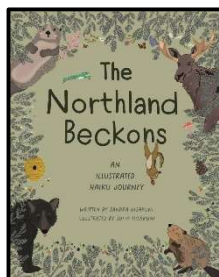
A historical novel based on the life of Belle Marion Greener. While in her 20's, she is hired by J. P. Morgan to curate a collection of rare manuscripts, books, and artwork for his newly built Pierpont Morgan Library. Belle becomes a fixture in New York City society and one of the most powerful people in the art and book world. But she has a secret that she must protect at all costs. Her dark complexion isn't because of her alleged Portuguese heritage; she's actually African American.

IF YOU SEE THEM: Young, Unhoused, and Alone in America by Vicki Sokolik, Spiegel & Grau, 2024.



A moving exploration of the crisis of homeless youth. Hiding in plain sight, they survive on free school breakfasts and lunches; join school sports teams to shower; and sleep on friends' couches, in parks, or on the streets. Sokolik wakes readers up to this issue through her own story of advocacy and through the voices of the kids themselves. Her grassroots action demonstrates the world-shifting power of compassion, acceptance, belonging, and self-determination, and the capacity each of us has to change our communities for the better.

THE NORTHLAND BECKONS; An Illustrated Haiku Journey by Sandra Hisakuni, Beaver's Pond Press, 2024.



A collection of haiku poetry written by a Minneapolis author and illustrated by her sister. It allows young readers to explore nature and meet the animals who call this wilderness home. "Sandra's use of poetry to describe the BWCA is captivating and Sofia's illustrations are authentic and heart-warming. MORE HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE FALL 2024 MEETING

Hennepin County Library's Experience with Banned Books



- A patron's book challenge may lead to a book being banned by the library but the author's first amendment rights also must be considered.
- Challengers aren't always conservatives as is commonly believed.
- Most of the challenged books are books for children and teens that have an LGBTQ+ storyline.
- The library wants to make these books available to people who want to read them to see what the controversy is all about. They also feel a responsibility to represent all points of view. This can be hard on the library staff.
- The Hennepin County Library typically receives 6-12 challenges in a year, but there were only 2 in 2023. They are considering ignoring challenges that are made by non-Hennepin County residents.
- Some publishers no longer print copies of their older books that are now controversial. Most notably, at the request of the Dr. Seuss estate, 6 titles that include racial and/or ethnic stereotypes are no longer available.
- While 46% of book challenges are made at public libraries, school libraries are also dealing with this issue. Parents are trying to control what other parents' children read; they reach out to their local school boards and county commissioners. Many parents organized over this issue during the COVID 19 epidemic when schools were closed.
- Book challenges aren't new. The first one was when the post office began delivering books by mail!
- During the McCarthy era, on June 25, 1953, the American Library Association adopted its Freedom to Read Statement: "We trust the people of this nation to make their own decisions about what they read and believe."
- County commissioners and school board members who oversee libraries are elected positions. **Your vote counts.**

The Library Ministry at Westwood Lutheran Church began in 1955. It is funded by a grant and has over 5,000 books in 2 distinct spaces.

Carol Sandberg, Gustavus Adolphus Lutheran Church, shared her church's experience participating in Read Brave, a citywide book club hosted by Mayor Carter and the St. Paul Public Library. The theme in 2024 was "Celebrating Identities." The book selected was a young adult novel, ***Man o' War*** by Cory McCarthy. A Stonewall Honor Book, ***Man o' War*** is a candid and emotional coming-of-age story that follows the journey of an Irish Lebanese American trans teen navigating the challenges and joys of self-discovery and love amid the confines of a small, midwestern town. It is recommended for older teens and adults.



Laura Dirks talked about the book club at Hennepin Avenue United Methodist Church deciding to spend a year reading banned books. There was a lot of support from the church, including the creation of a bookmark to publicize the group. Group members were surprised to see so many of the classic books that they'd read in high school and college are now being banned. Conclusions: (1) Books that appear on lists of banned books also appear on lists of books that have won awards. (2) People who want to ban a book haven't always read the entire book. This can lead to a misunderstanding of what's being challenged. (3) Banning a book can have the effect of increasing its sales. Many of the banned books had depressing themes. A humorous book was selected to start 2025.

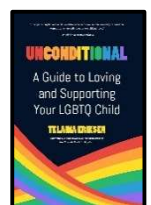
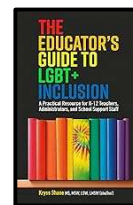
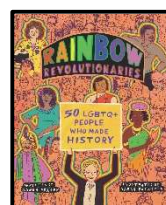
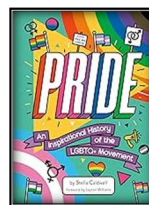
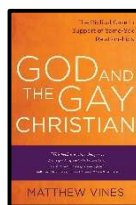
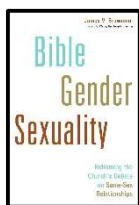

The TCACLA Spring 2025 meeting will be on Saturday, May 10, at Messiah United Methodist Church in Plymouth.
