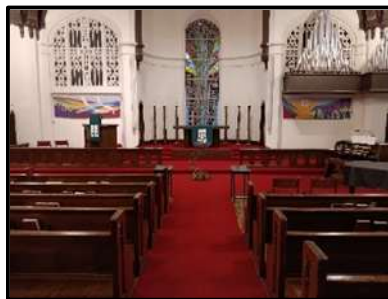

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE FALL 2025 MEETING

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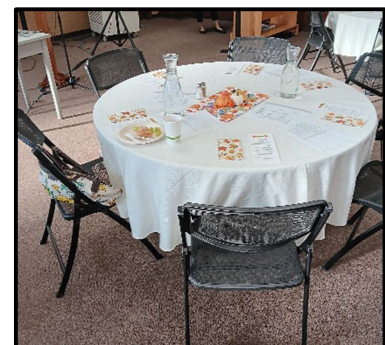
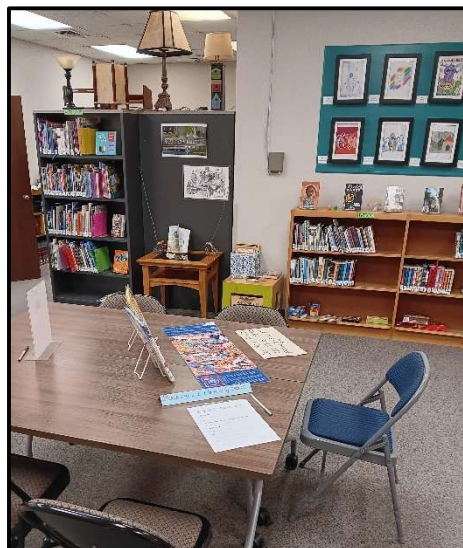

Protecting book covers in libraries is essential for maintaining their longevity and appearance. Here are some effective methods from Demco, a provider of library supplies.

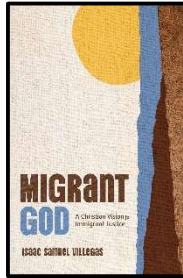
- **Plastic Covers:** Use adjustable or exact-size plastic covers for both hardcover and paperback books. Polyester covers are highly durable and safe for archival materials.
- **Dust Jacket Covers:** For hardcover books with dust jackets, transparent covers with paper liners can protect the graphics while adding durability.
- **Tape Reinforcement:** Reinforce the spine and corners of paperback books with clear, acid-free tape to prevent wear and tear.
- **Lamination:** Laminate paperback covers to make them more resistant to damage. Ensure the lamination material is acid-free to avoid deterioration over time.
- **Storage Practices:** Store books upright and avoid overcrowding shelves to prevent bending or warping.
- **Regular Maintenance:** Inspect books periodically for damage and repair them promptly to extend their lifespan.

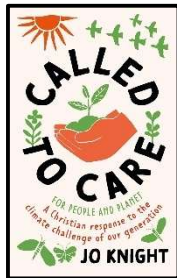

MIGRANT GOD; A Christian Vision for Immigrant Justice by Isaac Samuel Villegas, Eerdmans, 2025.



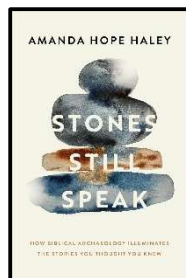
Centering the stories of people who have been transformed through their dedication to the work of collective wholeness, Villegas begins each chapter “on the ground”—with protests in the streets, hospitality in migrant shelters, and shared meals in home kitchens. He then engages in biblical, theological, and political reflection to explore the significance—for our faith and our world—of these sites of collective work. A stirring read for anyone who wants to shift conversations about immigration toward a more holistic Christian vision of life lived in solidarity with migrants.

CALLED TO CARE; A Christian Response to the Climate Challenge of Our Generation by Jo Knight, IVP, 2026.



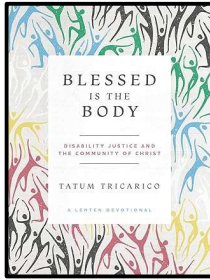
Stories from our global neighbors clarify the challenge of global warming. This book invites Christians to take climate justice seriously. Through inspiring stories, creative reflection and biblical teaching, readers will come to understand and connect creation and justice to their faith. This is a story of God growing a passion for caring for His creation and how Christians play an essential part.

STONES STILL SPEAK; How Biblical Archaeology Illuminates the Stories You Thought You Knew by Amanda Hope Haley, Revell, 2025.



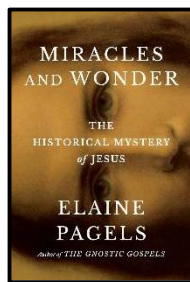
A Harvard-trained archaeologist and theologian scrapes back 2,000 years of misguided cultural interpretations to reveal God's Word in its historical, archaeological, and literary contexts. Far from a dry academic exercise, this process explains how misunderstandings developed and revitalizes the Scripture you thought you knew, with the greater purpose of encouraging a more intentional, rigorous study of the Bible in your daily life.

BLESSED IS THE BODY; Disability Justice and the Community of Christ by Tatum Tricarico, Herald Press, 2025.



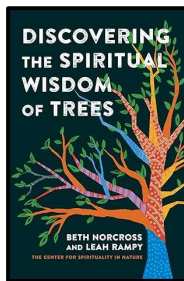
Disabled people have always known that their bodies and actions don't fit into boxes marked "perfect" or "endless." Every day, they encounter ableist, discriminatory practices that spell out the limits of bodies, minds, and human connection. Tricarico invites to readers to expand their understanding of God, themselves, and community with reflections and practices for considering disability justice, history, and culture alongside stories from the bible about disabled individuals like Moses and the woman with a flow of blood.

MIRACLES AND WONDER; The Historical Mystery of Jesus by Elaine Pagels, Doubleday, 2025.



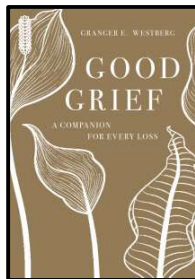
Pagels sheds light on Jesus's enduring power to inspire and attract. In this new account of the life of Jesus, she explores the mystery of how a poor young man inspired a religion that reshaped the world. Each chapter addresses a fascinating question and answers it based on the gospels Jesus's followers left behind. Why is Jesus said to have had a virgin birth? Why do we say he rose from the dead? Did his miracles really happen and what did they mean?

DISCOVERING THE SPIRITUAL WISDOM OF TREES by Beth Norcross and Leah Rampy, Broadleaf Books, 2025.



An exploration of the knowledge held within the living world of trees and planted within each of us. If we pay attention, trees have much to offer as soul friends and their millennia of growth and loss provides deep wisdom. The co-authors, who have extensive experience in both forest ecology and spirituality, encourage readers to revel in the beauty and wonder of trees as they increase our capacity to bear witness to loss and grief and model adaptation and resilience.

GOOD GRIEF; A Companion for Every Loss by Granger Westberg, Fortress Press, 2019.



After more than 50 years, *Good Grief* is still a best-seller at Fortress Press. Millions of readers have found comfort, understood their emotions, and regained hope after loss. This classic text identifies ten stages of grief--shock, emotion, depression, physical distress, panic, guilt, anger, resistance, hope, and acceptance--but, recognizing that grief is complex and deeply personal, defines no "right" way to grieve.

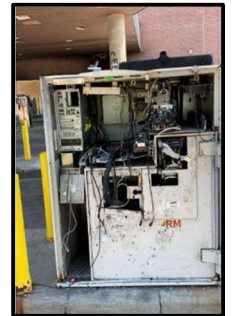
The youth and children have a library space all their own in a room adjacent to the adult library.

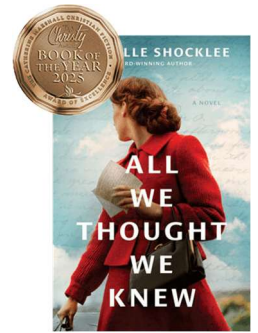

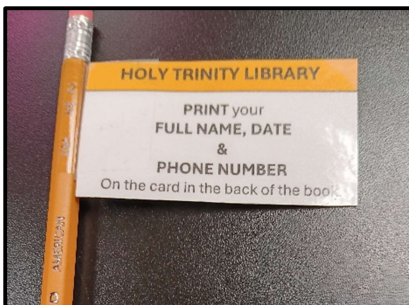
